"Community Service Awards" 2025

The Foundation recognizes and celebrates community minded spirit in our valley at the Annual Community Celebration.

The Swan Valley is blessed with community minded people supporting a number of projects and services that make our valley a better place to live. Often that work is quietly done behind the scenes.

Vern Sharp Community Service Award

This annual award established in 2023 is given to an individual that has tirelessly volunteered their time and efforts to maintain, improve or enhance the Swan Valley Community, often with little or no public recognition. This year it was given to John Tapp. It is commemorated with a photograph with special meaning to the recipient.

"Community Grant Awards"

Spring 2025

The Swan Valley Community Foundation received seven Spring 2025 Community Grants requests. All these were high quality requests. All were funded.

Grant recipients

American Legion Post 063 requested \$1,000 for supporting food fellowship and gatherings for local veterans that have served our nation. The foundation found this so worthy that they awarded it \$1,500. Devannie Burke

Alpine Artisans Inc. requested \$1,500 to support arts in the Swan Valley School with school workshops and concerts. Awarded \$1,500 Jenny Rohrer

Upper Swan Valley Historical Society requested \$1,500 to refurbish and seal logs on the 48 year old museum. Awarded \$1,500 Steve Lamar

Swan Valley Community Library requested \$1,500 to replace the worn out front door with a new door that matches the new doors on the front of the Community Hall. This also supports the community efforts at sprucing up the Community Hall area. Awarded \$1,500 Jenny Kauffman

Swan Valley PTA requested \$1,500 matching grant for the Missoula Children's Theater Program for Swan Valley School. This is a long standing tradition for elementary students in the Swan Valley and is regularly supported by the SVCF. Awarded \$1,500 Kitty Logan

SMAAART requested \$1,500 to supplement funding for Friday Club Activities for Swan Valley students. Awarded \$1,500 Kate Lewis

Swan Valley Elementary School Special Projects, library renovation requested \$1,500 as seed money to help obtain matching grants to support renovation project. Awarded \$1,500 Renee Sanning

Total Grants Awarded for Spring 2025 \$10,500

Smoke Elser, a well known outfitter, conservationist, teacher and author, was the featured speaker. Smoke at 92 years of age is a good example of "Aging Well." He epitomizes that aging well isn't about growing older and becoming a senior. It is about growing wiser, cherishing the present, and embracing the journey ahead with grace and gratitude.

The Swan Valley Foundation will be reaching out to other organizations in the valley to collaborate and support ways to enhance Aging Well In The Swan Valley.

The Swan Valley Community Foundation (SVCF) is a community oriented non-profit 501(c)(3) charitable organization whose sole purpose is the betterment of our community. The foundation incorporated in 2011 and received its non-profit 501(c)(3) status in 2012. It formally began operation in 2013. Following your suggestions made at the annual Community Celebration in 2023 and 2024, the Foundation expanded its board and developed new programs.

Our vision is a vibrant community of families living, recreating and working in the beautiful Swan Valley.

Our mission is providing resources facilitating the betterment of our community.

Our primary purpose is serving the Swan Valley Community...

Serving community needs is the only reason for our existence. SVCF is comprised of 9 non-paid board members and numerous volunteers. The organization is 100% supported by donations. All proceeds are returned to the Swan Valley Community through grants, community events and scholarships. Funds raised in 2024 from donations, events, and last year's celebration and live auction allows us in 2025 to:

Increase small grant award dollars by 180%. This year 7 Swan Valley organizations will receive a total of \$10,500. This is an increase from \$5,830 last year. Increase Scholarship awards from \$3,000 and 2 recipients to \$4,500 and 3 recipients. We are hosting three free major community events with a meal; Aging Well in the Swan, The Annual Community Celebration, and YOER for a combined cost of \$12,000. We increased seats at the Annual Celebration, from last year to 127 this year (and we still had to wait-list a number of folks). We are putting on the YOER 2025 event with additional educational classes and teachers. We are developing more community involvement in nominating and selecting service awards and moving the awards to the Aging Well Gathering.

All these events are free to the community and provide meals, gathering fellowship and increase the sense of Community in the Swan. We need your support to continue offering YOER, providing scholarships, community small grants, Aging Well Services, community service awards, and our annual Community Celebration and Dinner.
